# **PARTNERSHIP**







We continue to closely partner with the the Sawtooth National Forest - Ketchum Ranger District (KRD) on professional trail crew support, our Volunteer and Trail Monitoring Programs, and project funding and support.

We support the KRD trail crew by funding a portion of the wages for seasonal trail crew members. This crew maintains the majority of the 400+ miles of trails surrounding the Wood River Valley, and our support ensures they are fully staffed every season.

## **PARTNERSHIP**





In partnership with the BLM and the Blaine County Recreation District (BCRD) we assist with the ongoing maintenance of the Croy Canyon trail network, as well as other BLM trails near Hailey and Bellevue.

This is valuable because the BLM lacks a fully funded and staffed trail crew on their lands in our Valley (which is most the public land surrounding Hailey and Bellevue).

In 2023, we helped to magnify the work of BLM staff by assisting with the layout and design of the new BLM trails in the South Valley. We also provided matching funding for all three new trails.

We support the BLM through staff time, with our partnership with Wood River Mountain Bike Team, and through our Volunteer Program.

## **VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS**

#### 1 TRAIL BOSS PROGRAM

Huge shout out to our 2023 Trail Bosses! These super volunteers go through training to become essentially an additional staff member at our volunteer work parties. By supporting our staff at volunteer events, we can host larger and more audacious events (each Trail Boss can help manage 5 additional volunteers per event!)

In 2023, out of the 13 public volunteer events, 12 were attended by Trail Bosses - totaling 74.75 hours of volunteer time this summer.





# 02 MOTORIZED VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

As always, our local crew of motorized volunteers absolutely crushed it once again - diligently working throughout the season to keep your trails clear!

They logged out over 900 trees this season, clearing motorized trails accessed from Deer Creek, Greenhorn, Warm Springs, Baker Creek and more.

The WRTC pays for saw gas mix, chains and bar oil for those who spend their free time clearing trails. Thank you to all of the hard working moto volunteers.

# O3 BRING YOUR OWN CREW PROGRAM

We launched a new program this year - the Bring Your Own Crew (BYOC) Program - where we hosted large groups or companies for volunteer work parties tailored to them. Whether it was a morning away from the office for Windermere, an afternoon on Shady Side with Wild Rye, or evenings at Greenhorn with the Bike Team, we are stoked to announce that we hosted 8 BYOC events this year, resulting in over 200 hours of work done on our trails.


3 CHANGE MAKERS

## TRAIL MONITORING PROGRAM



Please note that the numbers displayed represent the amount of times someone passed by a counter meaning someone who went out and back was counted twice.

The 2023 Trail Monitoring Program brought some big changes: we made the data available to you with this handy interactive platform on our website and we were also able to leave trail counters out at their sites for the whole season, increasing the accuracy and efficiency of the program.

Looking forward we will continue to collect annual data and explore new ways to grow public trail accessibility through the use of monitoring data.

#### TRAIL SELECTION

Every year, we try to select a few trails that see a lot of traffic, and a few trails that are 'off the beaten path'. We like to keep a trail counter at some of the most popular trails (like Adam's Gulch Main and Greenhorn Main), but otherwise, we rotate our counters throughout the area to get quasi-annual data on a bunch of trails, which gives us a bigger view of traffic patters throughout our trail region.

#### 3 WEBSITE

This year, we launched a super rad website that shows all of the data that we're collecting through this program. It is a more comprehensive look at this data across years, so you can see trends, traffic patterns, and movement of our trail counters.

# ADAM'S GULCH ADAPTIVE SPORTS TRAIL ENHANCEMENT PROJECT













In 2021, the Ketchum Ranger District partnered with the National Forest Foundation, Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, Higher Ground and the Wood River Trails Coalition to reimagine the Adam's Gulch Trailhead as an inclusive upgrade to a beloved community resource.

Throughout 2021 and 2022, these partners galvanized the community to support the Adams Gulch Adaptive Sports Trail Enhancement Project and this year we celebrated the grand opening of this project.

The purpose of the Adams Gulch Adaptive Sports Trail Enhancement Project is to improve the overall visitor experience at this popular trailhead while maximizing and expanding the opportunities for the adaptive sports community.

Visitors to the area will notice the results of the last two years worth of work in the new parking configuration, the new restroom

facilities, enhanced stream crossings and bridges, and in the brand new purpose-built trail - Low Hanging Fruit. These enhancements address long standing capacity issues with the trailhead, and will allow the space to continue to serve our community for years to come.

The new Low Hanging Fruit trail provides an exciting trail opportunity for adaptive cyclists, allowing them to enjoy the thrill of a downhill flow trail while also minimizing user conflicts on other sections of the overall Adams Gulch trail network.



## STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

We launched our 2023 - 2026 Strategic Plan this year, which will help guide our critical decisions over the next three years. We are one year in, and we've made huge strides. Below you'll see our strategic priorities, the accomplishments we've made toward that priority, and our outstanding goals.

#### STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1

#### 30%

Pursue programming that results in "tools in the dirt" trail work within the Wood River Valley in a way that not only creates and maintains trails, but also creates generational stewardship.

Accomplishments: Prepared to launch the hybrid trail crew with the USFS Sawtooth National Forest Ketchum Ranger District; applied for the BLM contract to build new trails around Hailey and Bellevue; began fundraising for Greenhorn Trailhead Improvements.

Goals: Launch hybrid trail crew; examine Valley-wide trail crew opportunities, implement 1-2 trail projects with the USFS KRD





#### STRATEGIC PRIORITY 2

#### 50%

Grow our organizational capacity to achieve our strategic plan while investing in our people and their ability to bring their whole selves to this work.

**Accomplishments:** Developing improved financial policies and controls, developing compensation policies and structures.

**Goals:** Hire Finance and Administration Coordinator, continue to implement financial policies and controls, and HR policies.

**Accomplishments:** Hired Development Director, migrated to modern CRM **Goals:** Increase membership base annually, develop ambassador program




